

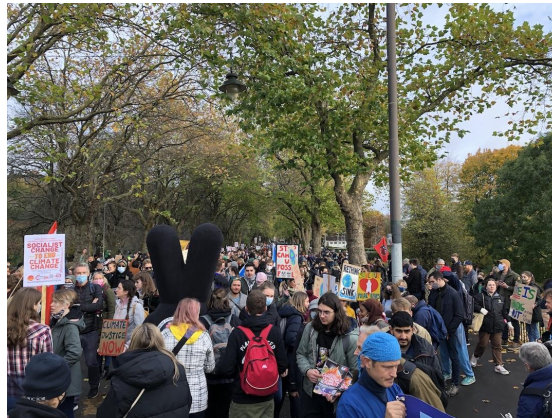
Snapshots from Glasgow - Dave Menz

Fridays For Future march congregates at Kelvingrove Park adjacent to University of Glasgow. 30,000 joined that day; 100,000 the next day.

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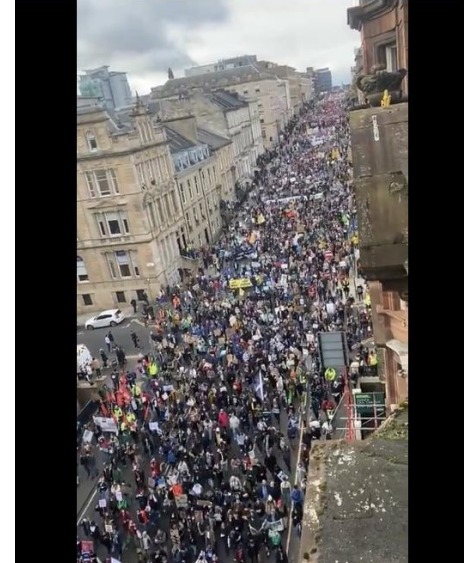

A view of 30,000 people downtown Glasgow at Fridays For Future; similar marches around the world.

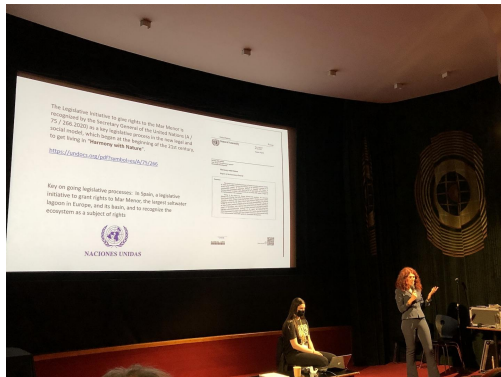
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Expensive versions of the posters installed by public services (bus stop).
